Welcome and Introduction

The minister welcomes us to the service.

Our nation and commonwealth has recalled that moment through our Armistice and Remembrance events down the decades, decades during which the men and women of our armed services have continued to pay the ultimate sacrifice.

And so, we gather here today to remember lives sacrificed in the service of our Country, and those traumatised and injured in conflict. May we have such a devotion to justice and freedom that the heroism of all who fought, and still fight, may continue to be remembered in a nation of service and in a world of peace.

Today, we gather to commemorate all those who gave their lives fighting for the freedom of all.

So, let us pray.

All: O Lord, our maker and our strength, from whose love in Christ we can never be parted either by death or defeat:

May our remembrance this day deepen our sorrow for the loss and wastes of war,

make us more grateful to those who courageously gave their lives

to defend this land and commonwealth; and may all who bear the scars and memories of conflicts, past and present,

know your healing love for the sake of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace. Amen.

During the hymn the colour parties will bring their colours to the sanctuary where they will be offered to God.

O God, our help in ages past, our hope for years to come, our shelter from the stormy blast, and our eternal home;

beneath the shadow of thy throne thy saints have dwelt secure; sufficient is thine arm alone, and our defence is sure.

And in your mercy, restore and remake us, that we may act justly, keep faith, and walk in the way of your commandments, in justice and in peace, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

The minister assures us of God's forgiveness:

Almighty God, who forgives all who truly repent, have mercy upon you, pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and keep you in life eternal; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.

I vow to thee, my country all earthly things above, entire and whole and perfect, the service of my love; the love that asks no questions, the love that stands the test, that lays upon the altar the dearest and the best; the love that never falters, the love that pays the price, the love makes undaunted the final sacrifice.

And there's another country,
I've heard of long ago,
most dear to them that love her,
most great to them that know;
we may not count her armies,
we may not see her King;
her fortress is a faithful heart,
her pride is suffering;
and soul by soul and silently

Reading

We sit for the first reading from the Bible, taken from Joshua, chapter 5, verses 13 to 15.

Joshua was near Jericho when he looked up and saw a man standing in front of him with a sword in his hand. Joshua went to him and asked, "Are you a friend or an enemy?"

The man answered, "I am neither. I have come as the commander of the Lord's army."

Then Joshua bowed face down on the ground and asked, "Does my master have a command for me, his servant?"

The commander of the Lord's army answered, "Take off your sandals, because the place where you are standing is holy." So Joshua did.

This is the word of the Lord.

And did those feet in ancient time walk upon England's mountains green? And was the holy lamb of God on England's pleasant pastures seen? And did the countenance divine shine forth upon our clouded hills? And was Jerusalem builded here among those dark satanic mills?

I will not cease from mental fight, nor shall my sword sleep in my hand, till we have built Jerusalem in England's green and pleasant land.

Reading

We sit for the second reading from John's Gospel, chapter 15, verses 5 to 17.

Jesus said, "I am the vine, and you are the branches. If any remain in me and I remain in them, they produce much fruit. But without me they can do nothing. If any do not remain in me, they are like a branch that is thrown away and then dies. People pick up dead branches, throw them into the fire, and burn them. If you remain in me and follow my teachings, you can ask anything you want, and it will be given to you. You should produce much fruit and show that you are my followers, which brings glory to my Father. I loved you as the Father loved me. Now remain in my love. I have obeyed my Father's commands, and I remain in his love. In the same way, if you obey my commands, you will remain in my love. I have told you

these things so that you can have the same joy I have and so that your joy will be the fullest possible joy.

"This is my command: Love each other as I have loved you. The greatest love a person can show is to die for his friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you. I no longer call you servants, because a servant does not know what his master is doing. But I call you friends, because I have made known to you everything I heard from my Father. You did not choose me; I chose you. And I gave you this work: to go and produce fruit, fruit that will last. Then the Father will give you anything you ask for in my name. This is my command: Love each other.

This is the word of the Lord.
